- 1. Summary In Christ we win!
- Purpose God gave the book of Revelation to encourage Christians – in the face of persecution – to ◆stand firm, ◆not shrink back, and ◆look forward to Jesus' final victory over all the forces of evil!
- Literary Form Apocalyptic literature "an effort to portray the future by means of strange and even fantastic symbolism."¹
- 4. <u>Interpretation</u> NT truths about the victory of good over evil.
- 5. <u>Numbers</u> *Most* or *all* are to be taken *symbolically*. These are some examples:
 - a. 3 God (Triune).
 - b. 3½ NT era:
 - i. Time, times, and half a times.
 - ii. 1260 days.
 - iii. 42 months.

Revelation 1:1-8

Introduction: ¹ The Revelation [Aποκάλυψις] of Jesus Christ, which **God** gave Him to show to His bond-servants [δούλοις], the things which must shortly take place; and **He** [Jesus] sent and communicated *it* by **His angel** to **His bond-servant John**, ² who bore witness...

- 1. Aποκάλυψις "is an 'unveiling,' a 'making known' of things that have [before this time] been hidden."²
- 2. "shortly" God's perspective! NIV 2 Peter 3:8 "...With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day."

Blessed is he who **reads** and those who **hear** the words of the prophecy, and **heed** the things which are written in it; for the time is near.

A description of Jesus: 5 ...the <u>faithful</u> witness, the <u>first-born</u> of the dead, and the <u>ruler of the kings of the earth</u>.

Revelation 1:9-20

Jesus' description of Himself: ¹⁷ ... I am the first and the last, ¹⁸ and the living One [the source of life]; and I was dead [Good Friday], and behold, I am alive forevermore [Easter], and I have the keys of death and of Hades [the power to release from the grave].

The Seven Letters in General

- 1. The entire book of Revelation was written to the seven churches (1:4), which represent all NT Churches.
- 2. The seven churches are *real churches* in *real cities* in *real geographical order*.
- 3. Most of the letters have these seven parts in this order:
 - a. Command to write.
 - b. Description of the speaker.
 - c. Word of commendation.
 - d. Word of criticism.
 - e. Word of admonition.
 - f. Call to hear.
 - g. Word of promise.

Revelation 2:1-7 Letter to the Church in Ephesus

Word of Criticism: 4 ...you have left your first love. (See Becker, page 48)

Word of Admonition: ⁵ Remember therefore from where you have fallen [from the time in your life when you had and showed sincere gratitude for God's gift of salvation], and repent and do the deeds you did at first... – "A lack of daily repentance may lead finally to a complete loss of faith." (Becker, 49)

Revelation 2:8-11 Letter to the Church in Smyrna

Word of Commendation: "I know your tribulation and your poverty (but you are rich)..." — "The Christians in Smyrna either belonged to the poorer classes in the city or they had lost their possessions through persecution." (Becker, 51-52).

2 Corinthians 8:9; (2 Cor. 6:1-10)

The Admonition: ¹⁰ "Do not fear what you are about to suffer....Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life." – "The seeming defeat they suffered when they died at the hands of their enemies will become their victory." (Becker, 53) Hebrews 10:39 "...we are not of those who..."

The Promise: 11 "He who overcomes shall not be hurt by the second death." – "This is the second death, the lake of fire." (Rev. 20:14 NAU)
